Our Thanks to Ann Moyal

Ann Moyal is stepping down from the Editorial Board of *Prometheus*. She has been a member of the Board for many years, having previously served as Honorary Editor of the journal, a post she eventually surrendered because she insisted she had no idea what the title meant. Now, as Ann puts it, she simply wants to give someone else a go.

Ann attended the journal's birth more than twenty years ago – she was even there at the conception – and has helped guide its progress ever since. She has published in *Prometheus*, of course, and she has refereed papers submitted to it on the history of science, on telecommunications and on women. And she has performed all the other duties of an Editorial Board member with her customary gusto. While Ann has long been a good friend of the journal, she has also been rather more. For twenty years she has promoted *Prometheus* whenever and wherever the opportunity has arisen, and she has not infre-

quently made opportunity when it would not otherwise have arisen. Ann is not easily daunted. There can be no one who knows Ann – and a great many do know Ann – who is not aware of her connection with *Prometheus*. She has been absolutely relentless in her advocacy. Certainly the editors have never been left unaware of her interest in the journal, and of her opinions on how it should be run. They have not always felt able, or been able, to follow her advice, decorum and the law of libel being powerful constraints, but they have always been the richer for her opinion. Without Ann's influence, *Prometheus* – and it might not have survived without Ann's influence – would have been a duller thing with narrower interests. It would probably have forsaken its original historical bent, and so would have lost the context and sheer civilising influence which only history can provide.

Ann is not retiring. For the Godmother of Australian history of science, retiring is not really an option. She is merely stepping down from the Editorial Board so that someone else can serve the interests of the journal. It is hard to imagine anyone capable of doing this with the remorseless energy and ruthless dedication which Ann always brought to the task. It is harder still to imagine she who wags her finger at government ministers, who taunts the high and mighty with their own pomposity, who pours coffee over the heads of vice-chancellors, settling down by the fire with her quilting. Ann Moyal will no doubt be as active in the interests of *Prometheus* as she has always been, and as ready to offer her advice. The world could not be otherwise.
